

**PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT SUPPLEMENT**  
**ADOPTED BY COUNCIL 2/6/07 FOR TRANSITIONAL PURPOSES**

For 2008, any activity that would have counted in one of the letters on the old PDR, may be counted in the item number in the left column on the new PDR.

**NOTES:**

1. Letter T is different on the old Kings County PDR and therefore should be counted as a communication activity (#6) on the new PDR.
2. Not every activity currently in the county is listed on the old supplement which was last revised in 2003. Use the guidelines for the new 2008 PDR to determine where new activities would be counted.

<b>Category for New PDR Starting in 2007</b>	<b>KINGS COUNTY 4-H PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT (OLD) SUPPLEMENT Revised 6/08</b>
<b>3</b> <i>4-H Events Attended</i>	<b>C. 4-H CAMP</b> - This must be an organized educational camping experience, not just a retreat. We currently have none of these in Kings County, except where a club may plan a camping and outdoor education program that includes at least one night camping. You may include participation in 4-H camp for another county.
<b>3</b> <i>4-H Events Attended</i>	<b>D. FIELD DAY</b> - Attendance at the following:  Kings County 4-H Field Days planned from time to time. Kings County 4-H Presentation Day (Kings County, Sectional, State, Club or inter club if not used in U below.) Additional field days sponsored by colleges, universities, or businesses related directly to 4-H projects.
<b>3</b> <i>4-H Events Attended</i>	<b>E. STATE LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE</b> - Attendance at State 4-H Leadership Conference held each August.
<b>4</b> <i>4-H Leadership Development</i>	<b>F. COMMITTEE CHAIR</b> - Count chairmanships of any committees listed in <b>J</b> below and any additional 4-H committees. Do not also count as committee memberships.
<b>2</b> <i>4-H Project/Skill Activities</i>	<b>G. JUDGING CONTEST</b> - Participation in an organized 4-H judging contest on any level. (Example: County Judging Day or club judging contest. - Member must be the judge of animals or items.)
<b>6</b> <i>4-H Communication Skills</i>	<b>H. WROTE &amp; PUBLISHED</b> - Count each article concerning 4-H which you submit to any newspaper or radio or television station, including the club or county 4-H newsletter or website.
<b>6</b> <i>4-H Communication Skills</i>	<b>I. REPRESENTED 4-H</b> - <b>Include all personal appearances in connection with 4-H work not reported elsewhere</b> (i.e., master of ceremonies, entertainer, fashion revue commentator, demonstration day judge or clerk, local exhibit day or fair judge, host or hostess at fairs <b>OR</b> any participation in a non-4-H event representing 4-H (You may count outreach activities here or in <b>T</b> below.) Here are some examples of non-4-H activities which would be counted here.  Appearing in a parade as a 4-H member Visiting schools or organizations as a 4-H member Putting on a 4-H Petting Zoo or other 4-H activity for non-4-H audience Building Patrol at Kings County Fair Runner at fair auction Participating in the Kings County Fair as a 4-H member Participating in any non-4-H event as a 4-H member

<p><b>4</b> <i>4-H Leadership Development</i></p>	<p><b>J. COMMITTEE MEMBER</b> - Participation as a member on any club, county, sectional and state committees. Examples of county committees include: Judging Day Committee, Presentation Day Room M.C., etc. All club committees such as refreshments, event-planning and other committees are also eligible here.</p>
<p><b>4</b> <i>4-H Leadership Development</i></p>	<p><b>K. JR/TEEN LEADERSHIP</b> - Completion of one year as a junior or teen leader. A Junior Leader is in the 6th Grade or above and a Teen Leader is in the 9th Grade or above.</p>
<p><b>6</b> <i>4-H Communication Skills</i></p>	<p><b>L. GAVE PREPARED 4-H TALK</b> - Any prepared talk such as a project report at project or club meetings, talks to other groups, etc. <b>Do not include talks you give as an officer or committee chairperson or member. (No time limit on the talk.)</b></p>
<p><b>4</b> <i>4-H Leadership Development</i></p>	<p><b>M. HELD AN OFFICE</b> - Includes offices held in your 4-H club or in a countywide 4-H organization, sectional, or state organization. Project offices also report here.</p>
<p><b>6</b> <i>4-H Communication Skills</i></p>	<p><b>N. RADIO OR TV APPEARANCE</b> - Report all appearances as a participant before a radio or TV audience in connection with 4-H work.</p>
<p><b>7</b> <i>4-H Honors/ Recognition</i></p>	<p><b>O. MEDALIST</b> - County Record Book Medalist, Medal Winner at County or Sectional Presentation Day, Horse Achievement Medal Winner.</p>
<p><b>2</b> <i>4-H Project/Skill Activities</i></p>	<p><b>P. PROJECT EXHIBIT</b> - Exhibited livestock and/or other 4-H projects at fairs, field days, or any other public exhibition, including Favorite Foods Fair, the 4-H Fair, and Kings County Fair and other events at which you exhibit your 4-H projects. Count one for each project area exhibited, not for each item. (Example: one for Clothing at the 4-H Fair, one for Foods at the 4-H Fair and one for Sheep at the 4-H Fair.)</p>
<p><b>8</b> <i>Lifestyle Activities</i></p>	<p><b>Q. PARTICIPATION OTHER THAN 4-H</b> - School activities, church, sports, community, etc. Count only once per year for each type of activity.</p>
<p><b>6</b> <i>4-H Communication Skills</i></p>	<p><b>R. GAVE 4-H PRESENTATION</b> - Report the number of times you gave a 4-H presentation, either alone or as a member of a team at project meetings, local club, county, Sectional, and state events, as well as at service clubs, PTA meetings, school, or other groups. Presentations must be prepared in advance. Do not count demonstrations given as part of your Junior Leader or Teen Leader project here. <b>(This must be one of the items completed to earn a star.)</b></p>
<p><b>1</b> <i>4-H Projects Completed This Year</i></p>	<p><b>S. NUMBER OF PROJECTS COMPLETED</b> - Report the number of different projects you completed each year, such as Sheep, Foods, Photography, etc. A completed project is one in which the quality and quantity of the work meets your leader's approval. You can also count the Leadership Development Project here. <b>(This is one of the items that must be completed to earn a star.)</b></p>
<p><b>6</b> <i>4-H Communication Skills</i></p>	<p><b>T. PROMOTION ACTIVITY</b> - Count each activity in which you helped promote 4-H and reach out to encourage others to join. Such things as passing out flyers about 4-H, putting up a 4-H display in the community and actively campaigning for others to join count here.</p>
<p><b>3</b> <i>4-H Events Attended</i></p>	<p><b>U. ATTENDED EVENT</b> - Count here attendance at any 4-H event, even as just a spectator. Participation in many events may also be counted in another category. In such cases you can count an event in two or more places, see parenthesis below for explanation.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Attendance at any 4-H event, except club, project, or committee meetings. If you also entered the event, you may count that active participation and/or exhibition of projects in G, P, R or Z depending on whether it was a Judging Contest, a Project Exhibit, Presentation Day or a showmanship or Fashion Revue contest.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">4-H Fair Attendance Achievement Night Sectional Leaders Council Meetings Officer Training School Project, Presentation, Fashion Revue, Record Book Workshops, etc. Favorite Foods Fair (also count in P if you entered &amp; are in Foods Project) Judging Day (also count participation in G)</p>

	<p>LCORT Regional Conference  Any Citizenship Focus Trip  Presentation Day (inter-club, county, sectional and state days may be counted as field days instead of events attended; also count giving a presentation in R.)  Fashion Revue (also count participation in Z)  Field Days not counted in D. above.  Local club and joint club activities other than regular meetings.  Any sectional or state events</p>
<p><b>7</b>  4-H Honors/  Recognition</p>	<p><b>V. COUNTY WINNER</b> - The county winner in a particular countywide competition. A county winner is a member who wins at the highest level in the county and there is no further competition at county level. Examples are:</p> <p>County Winner Record Book competition.  Judging Day High Point Individual  Fashion Revue Winner for Grade Level  Overall Winner at Favorite Foods Fair  Best Exhibit Winner in any division at 4-H Fair or Kings County Fair  4-H Champion Market Animal at the 4-H Fair or Kings County Fair  4-H Champion Dairy Replacement Heifer at the 4-H Fair or Kings County Fair  4-H Grand Champion Dairy Animal at the 4-H Fair or Kings County Fair  Jr. Champion Dairy Animal at 4-H Fair  Sr. Champion Dairy Animal at 4-H Fair  Champion Dairy Replacement Heifer at 4-H Fair  Any overall high point award at a county 4-H horse show  Winner of Showmanship for age level at 4-H or Kings Fair</p>
<p><b>7</b>  4-H Honors/  Recognition</p>	<p><b>W. OTHER - INDIVIDUAL ACHIEVEMENT</b> - Other significant 4-H accomplishments that do not count elsewhere. Do not count ribbons won by Danish Judging (where everyone could win blue ribbons). <b>In Kings County we are not limiting awards/honors to only the highest award listed.</b></p> <p>Sectional Council Delegate;  Gold Seal winner at County or Sectional Presentation Day;  Winning a placing ribbon (usually 1st through 10th) in showmanship or market classes for any specie at the 4-H Fair or Kings County Fair;  Winning a placing ribbon (usually 1st through 10th) in any division for your age at County Judging Day;  Favorite Foods Fair Division Winner;  Winner of Round Robin Showmanship at 4-H Fair or Kings County Fair  Winning a plaque at 4-H Fair;  All Star or Emerald Star.</p>
<p><b>7</b>  4-H Honors/  Recognition</p>	<p><b>X. OTHER - GROUP ACHIEVEMENT</b> - Report each group activity, event, achievement, accomplishment, endeavor that does not fit in any other category for a group. Could include winning the team judging award at Judging Day or club or group awards at various events.</p>
<p><b>5</b>  4-H Citizenship/  Community  Service</p>	<p><b>Y. COMMUNITY SERVICE</b> - Report participation when you take an active part with other members of your club or group in a planned program of community service. <b>We are allowing re-occurring events to count more than just once. (e.g. monthly visits to a convalescent home count each time they happen.)</b></p>
<p><b>2</b>  4-H  Project/Skill  Activities</p>	<p><b>Z. PROJECT SHOWING CONTEST</b> - Active Participation 4-H events where you are being judged along with your project work. Examples include:</p> <p>4-H Fashion Revue  4-H Horse Show  4-H Animal Showmanship (including dogs, rabbits, poultry, livestock, dairy, etc.)</p>
